Extra pulmonary TB is a common and under diagnosed condition. CNS TB is associated with high morbidity and mortality. We present a case of a patient having TB Myelitis developing Guillen Barre Syndrome. This is a very rare presentation and the patient made a good recovery.

Conclusions

CNS TB should be considered in differential diagnosis in patients having suggestive clinical features. Any type of CNS TB should be detected early and treated promptly to prevent morbidity and mortality.
