

Abstract

Thrombotic microangiopathy (TMA) is not an uncommon but an under recognized manifestation of hump nosed viper bite in Sri Lanka. Microangiopathic haemolytic anaemia (MAHA), acute kidney injury(AKI), and thrombocytopenia is the triad of TMA. In this case, a 70-year-old previously well gentleman was transferred from a local hospital to the tertiary care centre 24 hours after the hump-nosed viper bite with AKI. With the blood picture evidence of MAHA and thrombocytopenia, the diagnosis of TMA was made.
